St. Thomas Aquinas (1225-1274)

By universal consent, Thomas Aquinas is thought to be one of the greatest teachers of the Catholic Church during the Medieval Ages. He holds the title of Doctor of the Church and Angelic Doctor. At the age of 5, he was taken to a Benedictine Monastery in Italy with the hope that he would adopt their way of life and become an abbot. While studying in Naples, he became interested in Aristotle's philosophy. He then abandoned his mother's wishes and joined the Dominicans. His mother then ordered his brother to kidnap him, and kept Thomas at home for over a year!

Once he was free, he went to Paris and Cologne where he studied with St. Albert the Great, lived in the court of Pope Urban IV, and spent hours debating the Franciscans about the teachings of Aristotle.

His greatest contribution to the Catholic Church are his writings which show the unity and harmony of continued faith and natural human knowledge. Thomas saw the whole natural order as coming from God, and reasoning as a divine gift to be highly cherished. His greatest known, and unfortunately uncompleted, work is the *Summa Theologiae* which deals with the broadest sense of Catholic Theology.

When asked why he couldn't finish the work, Thomas humbly replied that "all he studied and knew seemed like nothing as to that which he had witnessed and that had been revealed to him." He died March 7, 1274.

From Father David

How can my dad be 96? I remember when he ran like the wind and my little legs as a child couldn't keep up with him. Of course he never left me behind, and was always there for my brothers and sisters, as was our mom.

In those days he was a fireman—or "firefighter" as they are more often called now—and worked "twenty -four hours on, and forty-eight hours off." Such was great for us kids on his days off, but the "twenty-four hours on" was not so great for our mom raising six kids at the time!

She managed stoically, but worried about our dad in such a dangerous job. She even had a static-prone scanner over which some emergency services reports came across. She often listened prayerfully into the night to those reports that all was going okay. Those years seem like yesterday in some ways now.

My dad witnessed horrendous things in the course of his career with fire's destructive scarring ways. I was a very young child, probably not even yet in kindergarten, when disaster struck: A young firefighter perished under a caved-in brick wall, leaving a family at home, including a pregnant wife. Even as a little kid I noted the magnitude of this event, and learned how fragile and precious life is.

Isn't it something how some memories remain so strong? Our dad recalls those years quite vividly, including some eccentric characters at fire scenes along the way. One house to which an alarm was made was called by him "the flea house" because it was absolutely floor-to-ceiling infested with fleas. At another house an embarrassed individual got a big toe stuck in a bathtub's faucet!

We—our dad's family and friends—are blessed that at 96 he still has such a strong memory (combined with such a joyful sweet nature).

Friends, let us pray for all who work in service roles in our community—including those in Law Enforcement—and ask our Lord to protect and guide them. Let us, also, honor all our elderly for what they have done to serve us and our church; may we strive to always treat them with gratitude, respect, and dignity in the Lord.
