St. Katharine Drexel



St. Katharine Drexel, March 3rd

Katharine Drexel, born into a wealthy Philadelphia family in 1858, was well-educated and widely-traveled throughout Europe and The United States. On her $16^{\rm th}$ birthday, she made her grand debut into society.

Her father was an international banker. Being of the higher class, Katharine was not likely drawn into a life of voluntary poverty. But witnessing her mother opening their home to the poor three days each week, and her father spending quality time each evening in prayer, she was moved to consider devoting her life to the poor and needy. When she nursed her stepmother through a three-year terminal illness, Katharine saw that all the Drexel money could not buy safety from pain or death, and her life took a profound unique turn.

She had always been interested in the plight of the Indians, having been appalled by reading how the American natives were treated by the invading White-Man. While on a European tour, she met Pope Leo XIII and asked him to send more missionaries to Wyoming for her friend Bishop James O'Connor. The Pope replied, "Would you become this missionary?" His answer shocked her into considering new possibilities. Once back home, she visited the Dakotas, met the Sioux leader Red Cloud, and began her own system of charitable aid to Native American missions.

Katharine could easily have married and lived a pampered existence, but decided to give the remainder of her life to the Indians and to people of color. After three-and-a-half years of training, she and her first group of nuns—The Sisters of the Blessed Sacrament for Indians and the Colored—opened a boarding school in Santa Fe. A string of Catholic facilities followed. By 1942, she had a system of Black Catholic schools in thirteen states, plus forty mission centers, and twenty-three rural schools. Segregationists harassed her work, even burning a school in Pennsylvania. She also established fifty missions for Native Americans in sixteen states.

Two historical saints met when she was advised by Mother Frances Cabrini (Feast Day November 13) about the "politics" of getting her order's Rule approved in Rome. Later, Katharine's crowning achievement was the founding of Xavier University in New Orleans, the first Catholic university in the United States for African-Americans.

At seventy-seven, Katharine suffered a heart attack and was forced to retire. Her life of service seemed over. But then came almost twenty years of quiet intense prayer from a small room overlooking the convent sanctuary. Small notebooks and slips of paper record her various prayers, ceaseless holy aspirations, and deep meditation. She died at the age of ninety-six, and was canonized in 2000.

Saints have often said the same thing: Pray, be humble, accept the cross, love, and forgive. It is good to hear these from one who had the best materially in the world, but gave it away for a far greater, eternal, good. Also, remember Katharine is a fairly modern saint. She had pierced ears as a teenager, wore a watch, and could concern herself with the proper size and amount of pipe and brick for a new mission—Yes, a modern can-do woman. She reminds us holiness can be lived in any age.
