FISH FRY

Our 1st fish fry of this Lenten season is history, and we are gearing up for the next one! Please spread the word as we get ready for our 2nd fish fry this coming Friday, March 28th, once again from 4:00 to 7:00PM.

We will again have a drive-thru option on the east side of the hall (Webster Street). Or of course you can always come on in to eat, relax, and meet up with friends in the parish hall! Prices and menu will be the same as last week.

Prices: \$15.00 adult, and \$7.00 kids (10 and under)

The menu: Fried Fish, Shrimp, or Combo, coleslaw, baked potato, corn bread, Lenten baked beans, condiments and drinks (if eating in). There is also a kids' fish meal and a side option of a hot dog and chips.

Why Do We Abstain and Fast During Lent?

Why abstain and fast? The purpose of our fast is, not to become physically weak or lose weight, but to create a spiritual hunger only God can fill. In fasting during Lent, we express heartfelt love of God and acknowledge our sinfulness. Even though we remain unworthy, we pray that our sacrifices are acceptable to the one Who suffered and gave his life-blood for us, our savior Jesus Christ.

Fasting and abstaining are penitential practices that deny us food and drink during certain seasons and days. These acts of self-denial dispose us to free ourselves from worldly distractions, and to express our longing for Jesus—and to imitate in a highly limited way his suffering.

Traditionally abstinence has meant not eating meat. Many may recall a calendar hanging in their kitchen that included a fish symbol on each Friday of the month. This symbol is **not** to remind us to eat fish but rather to **AVOID** meat. While abstinence refers to the *kind or quality* of food we eat, fasting refers to the *quantity* of food consumed. It is against the spirit of fasting and abstinence to avoid favorite meats—while piling our plates overfull with fish and other non-meat foods!

Abstinence and fasting are required on both Ash Wednesday and Good Friday. On those days, one full meal is allowed along with two other much smaller "sustaining" meals. Catholics bound by the law of abstinence include everyone age 14 and over; while fasting includes everyone age 18 through their 60th year, depending on medical needs. Canon Law, the Catechism, Precepts of the Church, and the U.S. Bishop's document "Penitential Practices for Today's Catholic," and other reputable Catholic documents explain our fasting obligations if one wants more detailed information.

Annunciation of the Lord, March 25

The central focus of the Annunciation is the Incarnation: God is to become one of us! From all eternity, God decided that the Second Person of the Blessed Trinity would take-on human flesh, and that Mary (through her own free will) would have the off-the-charts amazing role of being His Mother! It is a God-given role, His grace working from beginning to end. Through Mary's free-will cooperation, God chooses to act.

Everything else is owed to The Blessed Trinity.

Mother Mary exemplifies the truth that amazing things can happen when one fully cooperates with God's grace!



From Father David

Sisters and brothers, in an emergency every second counts. Please be aware of our defibrillator and "Prepared Hero" fire blanket kept folded-up in a pouch in the vesting room if ever needed (at St. Elizabeth). Anyone is welcome in an emergency to enter the vesting room to retrieve either object. (We have a similar fire blanket at Our Lady of Lourdes, while members have discussed acquiring a defibrillator—sometimes called an AED—for the sacristy there soon.)

With the defibrillator, one applies sticky pads with sensors (electrodes) to the chest. Information about the person's heart rhythm is then sent to a computer in the AED device. The computer analyzes the heart rhythm to determine whether an electric shock is needed; If indeed needed, the electrodes deliver one or more shocks. (AEDs, if working correctly, are very user-friendly, and certainly can save lives.)

As for the fire blanket, it is of high quality and comes with a high rating. The blanket "smothers" small fires, with the aim of keeping the fire from spreading, and can be reused depending on condition after use.

Our churches continue to use candles for votive devotions and atop the altar. Other churches have gotten away from real burning candles at saint shrines, and use batteryoperated candles instead.

In Robinson, we continue to use real candles for now at the St. Elizabeth votive shrine, and have no plans to change this practice. Still, we ask everyone to please be mindful of the candles' burning, especially since the St. E. shrine is in the back-end of the Cry Room.

Parents and grandparents, please caution your children and grandchildren about burning flames, and teach them respected emergency responses like "Drop and roll." Around church candles, always monitor the kids carefully, especially when they are still quite young. (This sense of caution also includes, at St. Elizabeth, keeping the protective gate closed atop the basement interior steep steps.)

Of course, among our first responses to an emergency is to call 9-1-1. —The sooner the better. Again, seconds count!
